






U.S. Flu Activity – WA is high...











NREVSS National Respiratory Enteric Virus Surveillance System




Respiratory Syncytial Virus (RSV) Laboratory Testing









Flu Vaccines lowest in last three years and appear lower in Kitsap than US avg

Some Concerns (data from WA IIS, with some limitations*)

- <20% Kitsap residents under age 18 have received flu shots 8/1-11/30/22
- ~30% Kitsap residents 18 and older have received flu shots same period
- Compares to 44% WA residents 7-12/21; 40% US kids 6mo-17 years ('22)**

IMPACTS

- Unprecedented volumes of pediatric ED visits
- Record numbers of pediatric hospitalizations
- Pediatric flu death reported in King County
- Limited pediatric hospital capacity in WA
 - 4 Peds hospitals
 - 500 beds for 1.4 million kids
 - COVID hospitalizations 470 and slightly rising
- LTCF in Kitsap with flu

- an A/Darwin/9/2021 (H3N2)-like virus;
- a B/Austria/1359417/2021-like virus (B/Victoria lineage); and




Background

- KPHD's most recent strategic plan was created and approved by the Board in 2011, updated and board approved in 2016, and expired in 2021
- Creation of a new strategic plan was delayed by our COVID response
- We began the process to update our strategic plan in October 2022 with DOH consultant, Village Reach (VR)



What's in a Strategic Plan?


Strategic Plan Major Components



Two major components of a strategic plan

- 1. <u>Strategy Discernment</u>: Provides strategic direction. Without this planning lacks a clear purpose. (Green)
- 2. <u>Action Plan</u>: The plan to bring the strategy into being. Without this the strategy remains a vision. (Yellow and Orange).

Components are to develop:

- main objectives associated with each goal
- key metrics to monitor progress and highlight success
- activities under each initiative area
- a project plan/GANTT chart that identifies timelines for activities



Goal: To present new draft Strategic Plan to the Health Board for approval around May 2023





Goal: To share KPHD's strategic plan with internal and external stakeholders

Components:

- Create final report of strategic plan to highlight elements developed in the strategic planning process
 - <u>Audience</u>: employees, KPHB, key external partners
- Create 1-2 page summary of strategic plan
 - <u>Audience</u>: community members/public





Dissemination

Goal: To ensure the strategic plan is a living document that is used to keep focus on priorities, monitor progress, and reflect changing realities and timelines. Expect to create a 7-year plan.

Components:

- 3 check-ins between VR and KPHD through the end of 2023 to establish best practices in using the strategic plan and for assistance on maintenance and necessary updates to action plans
- Annual refresh of strategic plan in years 2-6 to review key objectives and prioritize activities for the coming year

 - Final report and 1-2 page summary when the new strategic plan is finalized and approved

What it looks like on the ground

- Continuing trends:
 - ED volumes are increasing, and surges aren't always predictable
 - Staffing plans tied to appropriate ED visit levels
 - Callouts and shortages of ED staff can impact some shifts
 - High acuity patients are always seen promptly
 - Patient care and outcomes are excellent



What we've accomplished since November

- EMS and SMMC leaders meeting regularly
- New ED Leadership in place
- Recruitment of new ED staff more coming in January
- Kaiz en events for process improvement
- Listening session to better understand frontline staff's needs and solutions



EMS Task Force Actions

- Exploring how Mission Control can support pre-hospital services
- Increase data sharing and understanding
- Crisis and float pool nurses
- Primary care recruitment
- Urgent care optimization
- Urgent Care vs Emergency Room Campaign

- Advocacy for allied health (not just nursing) training/education
